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"Walking the Path of New Life"

It is not surprising that in seventeen days we will celebrate Christ's resurrection and the promise of new life busting out all around us, since already crocuses and daffodils are blooming all around us, even though the winter snows refuse to be melted away quickly.

Yet, this Easter Season beckons us to walk the path of new life and discover what mysteries and joys our future has in store for us. One joyous mystery will be the start of the search for the new pastor, which will begin later in April once the report of the Pastoral Characteristics and Competencies Survey is complete and sent to you, followed by the Session approving the Mission and Ministry Report and sending to the Presbytery's Committee on Ministry for their approval April 19, followed by the election of a Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) and their completing the on-line Ministry Information Form (MIF) based on the small group meetings, the identity statement, the demographic analysis and community observers' reports and the result of the Pastoral Characteristics and Competencies Survey leading to the reception of Pastor Information Forms (PIF) of pastors matching the congregation's MIF.

This will be a time of mystery because no one knows how what candidates will be matched to this congregation, when those candidates will be available for interviews, where those candidates are geographically located, and how long the process will take to yield the person the PNC believes is the one God is sending to serve this congregation. It will be a time of joy because the anticipation and preparations for welcoming the new pastor will create energy for new ministries to begin and energy for re-starting of ministries silenced by the pandemic such as the community dinners. This new energy will give a spring in the steps for those folks challenged to map out the ways of welcoming the new pastor from the day the pastor comes to lead worship as a candidate, to the pastor moving into the community and the pastor becoming part of the community both the congregational community and the Baldwinsville community. What will that first Sunday for the new pastor look like? What rituals and liturgy of welcome will be used? Will the pastor's study be painted before her or his arrival? How will he or she get the keys to buildings?

However, even joyous mysteries along the path of new life will have some bumps, some stops and starts and will require patience and hope-filled persistence until the day of promise arrives.

For now, enjoy the beginning of the Easter Season of resurrection and the flowers of spring popping up to line the path of new life because in this season we affirm boldly and loudly, "Christ is Risen. Christ is Risen, indeed" and this is the foundation of our hope.

Session Highlights

 "Healthy Congregational Retreat" May/June 2022

As we redefine ourselves and move forward it is always important to learn from past mistakes or issues where we might have handled things differently. All organizations have conflict in varying degrees but having the skills to manage conflict with respect and courtesy is vital in keeping communication lines open. Rev. Carson will facilitate a congregational retreat that discusses methods for improving our communication and resolving issues where ideas and opinions may come in conflict with others. There will be more information about this once a specific date is scheduled.

- "Christian Education Committee"
 The church is continuing its search to fill the position for a Christian Educator. During the search Rev. Carson will share his experiences and thoughts on our program and will be meeting with Session and Committee Members on how we might bring the program back into focus at First Presbyterian Church of Baldwinsville.
- "Buildings and Grounds"

 It was reported that a few high-cost repairs, such as new doors, painting, tree trimming, and repairs to the east brick wall where it is thought there may be water leakage will be necessary very soon. R. Pond announced that April 30, 2022 is Spring Cleanup with a rain date scheduled for May 1, 2022.
- "Budget Report"

V. Jenkins reported that expenses are in line with the budget. Per the nation, investments have gone done over the last quarter but will hopefully improve with time. The "Special Gifts" fund has gone down by 7% and there will be a need to replenish this fund in May of 2022.

New "Administrative Committee"
 A committee entitled the "Administrative Committee" was approved as part of the

administrative cycle of First Presbyterian Church. In the reporting structure this committee would have the "Personnel" and another new committee, entitled the "Communications Committee" reporting on issues of filling open positions and the status of each one, and, then under "Communications" there would be structured policies and procedures developed on how we as a congregation communicate information both internally, and also to the public, i.e., our website. All members of the congregation are welcome to contact Rev. C. Mouser if they would like to serve on these committees as we establish a better communication process for everyone.

Assessing Baldwinsville Community Needs

The Reports by the Community Observers and the Demographic Analysis Team were received by the congregation following worship on March 13. The results of those reports led the members of the congregation in attendance to conclude the Baldwinsville Community has the following needs:

People living in poverty who are food insecure, may have transportation needs, access to healthcare needs, ability to access clothing on a seasonal basis- particularly families with children, and help paying heating bills during the winter.

Barb Winegard is planning to restart the senior/retiree community dinners this fall and is looking for folks to join her. Barb will be organizing the dinners on the odd numbered months beginning in September and is looking for someone to organize the dinners for the even numbered months. If you are interested in participating in this ministry, contact Barb.

Other possible ministries are transportation for disabled persons who lack access to a vehicle, ministry programs for children, childcare needs, elder care, education needs for children and older

adults as well as addressing possible social justice issues such as gentrification and income inequality.

In addition, the members of the congregation attending the meeting noted that there may be a need to sponsor refugee families because of the war in Ukraine. The congregation has a legacy of being active in refugee resettlement and this is a ministry the congregation may want to engage.

Also, the need to create better communication practices both within the congregation and to the community was addressed. Session has approved the creation of a Communication Committee to meet this need.

A summary report of the demographic analysis and community observers will be sent to the congregation, so that everyone in the congregation may have the opportunity to explore the ministry needs of the Baldwinsville community.

What is important about identifying the ministry needs of the community is for each member of the congregation to discern where their passion for ministry meets the needs of the community because where need and passion intersect is the place God is calling the congregation and each person to serve God and neighbors. So, where is your passion intersecting with the local or global community's need? Or as the hymn asks, "Who will go for us?"

This past February, Troop 107 has been working on strengthening our troop and helping younger scouts become more comfortable in leadership positions. We want our younger scouts to be more independent and take initiative not only in Scouts, but also in their daily lives. One way we have been assisting them to get there is by continuing to work on Eagle Scout rank required merit badges. In order to become an Eagle scout, 13 required merit badges must be earned along with an additional 8 merit badges of the scout's choice. There are many other requirements to achieve the prestigious rank, but scouts often find the merit badge process to be tedious and long. Given that only 6 in every 100 scouts in America receive this honorable title, we are helping prepare the younger scouts for this task by starting it with them.

We started the "Citizenship in the World" merit badge in January, finishing it this February! The scouts in our troop who did their research now have the badge and the knowledge that goes along with it.

The First Aid merit badge was also started in January, but this one took more time and was continued throughout March. This badge allows the average scout to gain important first aid knowledge and prepares them for potential emergency situations. Our very own Dr. Padalino, a First Aid merit badge counselor, has been so kind as to assist scouts during the process of earning the badge alongside giving informational presentations on First Aid situations and protocol.

Early on in February, on the first Saturday of the month, 5 scouts and a handful of parents ventured out to Longbranch Park with intentions to participate in the Klondike Derby. The event is an annual series of tasks that are completed by scout patrols in the snowy cold weather and given points based on time, efficiency, completion, and other factors depending on the activity. We placed 2nd overall, but it was a close call!

One of the last things done this past month, right before winter break, was a campout in the snow! A couple of scouts drove up to Redfield, NY



on Friday the 18th, stayed overnight in a cabin, them woke up early the next day to dig out snow caves. Bright and early on Saturday morning after breakfast, everyone went outside, picked their spot, and started digging. This year snow caves ended up looking more like igloos due to the compact snow. That night, those who built their own snow caves slept in them for the night. Surprisingly, scouts weren't cold despite the single digit weather outside! It was a great start to the upcoming week-long break from school!
