When one reads all of the scriptures for Lent leading up to and including Good Friday, what becomes very clear is that our Journey to Jerusalem with Jesus is a journey to deepen our trust in God, which will empower us to willingly give ourselves to God and God's way of being and serving the world. A deepened trust in the God, who redeemed Israel, who rescues the righteous, whose love and faithfulness are manifest in the coming of Jesus of Nazareth, who in turn, put his life into God's hands, lived a life of perfect obedience, suffered death of a slave and who was raised to new life by God, as Marianne Thompson, professor of New Testament has written.




This call to deepened trust in God will become more important and powerful for you as the Narrative Transition Process continues its movement to the community observation and assessment that begins in March and the completing of the Pastoral Characteristic and Competency survey leading to the beginning of the search for the next installed pastor, including the election of the Pastor Nominating Committee.

The Pastor Nominating Committee will use all the information created by the Narrative Transition Process to discern whom God is calling to serve you and partner with you as you journey into the future God is leading you to go. This call to deepened trust will be marked as well by the continuing ministries you will be doing and those new ministries that will be formed and shaped into reality.

This call to deepened trust in God is not about exterior signs of fasting, ashes, practices of piety or acts of giving something up for Lent. Rather, it is a call to self-reflection about the ways God has time and time again created pathways of new life to burst forth for each person and for this congregation and to discern how God may be creating new pathways for life even now.

May the blessings of the God of new life come to all of you in abundance during this season of deepening trust.

Seven Words to the Cross Bible Study

The Seven Words to the Cross Lenten Bible study begins in-person 10 am Monday March 7 with the same lesson repeated 7 pm Wednesday March 9 on Zoom. Pastor Carson will be leading both classes.

The Church Office will mail and email a daily devotional booklet to the congregation. The participants will use the booklet for the Lenten study throughout Lent, including Holy Week. The first Lesson begins with Ash Wednesday with the first word to the cross being "scorn."

Each week the class will study one word contained in the Scriptures chosen for each week. In addition to the word are questions for reflection and prayers, labyrinth meditations, and a finger labyrinth participants will use with the labyrinth meditations.

Each class will talk about the word for the week and address all the questions for each week. A new week begins each Wednesday.

Hopefully, everyone will participate in one of the classes and use the daily devotional booklet for their Lenten daily prayer practice on our journey from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday.
