"Our Freedom in Christ"

Howard Thurman describes Jesus as one of the disinherited in his book <u>Jesus and the Disinherited</u>. Jesus is among the disinherited because he was a minority within the Greco-Roman world and lived at risk. He did not have the security of Roman citizenship and he did not belong to a group allied with the Roman governing classes. He was a person, as Thurman describes, living within a society where he had to find a way to survive. The way Jesus chose to survive was to say that fear, hypocrisy, and hatred need not have dominion over him. For Thurman, it was as if Jesus said, "I will choose to react in a unique way than all those people living in this land. I choose to live with the kingdom of God within me."

This simple statement contains within it a radical freedom. A freedom so radical it defies the ability of others to dominate a person because it changes the way a person identifies themselves and changes the one who does the defining.



The same is true for this congregation. Your identity statement allows you to define who you are and what that means for you and how you will be "the loving family of God, following Christ by practicing our legacy of worship, education and mission to neighbors" in the daily living of this community of faith. Part of the legacy that is yours is following Christ by following his teachings which we have in scripture and how they reflect all God has been teaching, since the beginning of life. To understand this legacy leads to education because one needs to read and study scripture, both alone and in conversation with others. Another part of the legacy that is yours is being members of the reformed tradition that is defined by the Five Solas-Grace Alone, Faith Alone, Scripture Alone, Christ Alone, God's Sovereignty Alone-as well as the confessions, catechisms, theological declarations written for the church in different times and places to speak about what it means to be a follower of Christ and how those same confessions, catechisms and theological declarations speak to you at this time and in this place.

Finally, your legacy has within it the tradition of seeking the well-being of the community within which you dwell because if the community has well-being, then the church will have well-being. How you address this in mission to your neighbors is yours to decide based upon being followers of Christ and members of the reformed tradition.

The same radical freedom Jesus had to define himself without regard to the way other people sought to define him is yours. This is especially important to ponder as you live into the future God intends for you and as the Pastor Nominating Committee seeks the candidate God is sending to be your installed pastor.

May your season of discernment start now in this season of resurrection.

Financial endowments via wills and legacies offer some financial security to the church to fulfill its mission to serve where possible.
- Nominating Committee: Andy Brussel requested that a Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) be selected in preparation to move forward toward selecting a new pastor.
- Communications: Pastor Carson discussed a book entitled "Healthy Disclosure: Solving Communication Quandaries in Congregations", by Karen A. McClintock. He recommends this book and is looking into getting copies for the church to have.
